Karen P. DePauw serves as Vice President and Dean for Graduate Education and holds academic appointments as tenured Professor in the Department of Sociology and the Department of Human Nutrition, Foods & Exercise at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg, Virginia. Since her arrival at Virginia Tech, her major accomplishments include success in building a strong, diverse and inclusive graduate community; establishing the national award-winning innovative Graduate Life Center (GLC); and implementing the signature academic initiative known as Transformative Graduate Education (TGE), including the global perspectives and preparing the future professoriate programs.




Dr. Ellington Graves

Ellington Graves attended the Johns Hopkins University, graduating with a BA in sociology in 1986. He subsequently earned a master's degree in sociology from Virginia Tech and completed his doctoral studies in sociology at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He has been a faculty member of the Department of Sociology at Virginia Tech since August of 2000. He has served as the director of Virginia Tech's Africana Studies Program since 2012, and was recently appointed to the position of Assistant Provost for Inclusion and Diversity. He also serves as co-program director for the Equity and Social Disparity in the Human Condition Strategic Growth Area, working with university leaders to integrate consideration of issues of diversity and inequality into the strategic vision of the university.



Dr. Gena Chandler-Smith

Gena E. Chandler-Smith received her bachelor's degree (English) from Florida A&M University in 1996 and her Master's and Doctorate degrees (English) from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1999 and 2004, respectively. She is an associate professor and the director of the MA Program in English at Virginia Tech. Dr. Chandler-Smith's research interests include African American literature, American literature, postcolonial literature, pedagogy, and critical literary theory. She has published articles on the work of Charles Johnson, including a piece in Texas Studies in Literature and Language and a piece in the edited collection Charles Johnson: The Novelist as Philosopher (2007). Her book The Wanderer in African American Literature (University of Tennessee Press) is forthcoming in the spring of 2020. She has taught at the college level since 1998 and at Virginia Tech since 2004. She has earned the 2015 Virginia Tech Certificate of Teaching Excellence Award, the 2015 College of Liberal Arts and Human Sciences Carroll B. Shannon Excellence in Teaching Award, and the 2007 Diggs Teaching Scholar Award.
